- 1. CALL TO ORDER The meeting was called to order at 7:09 PM
- 2. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE JULY 13, 2021 MEETING
  - Minutes approved as submitted

- 3. PUBLIC COMMENTS
  - o None.
- 4. DISTRICT STAFF REPORT

#### A. BUDGET AND FINANCIAL REVIEW -

- Mr. Pope explained that the District has a healthy cash balance. For the end of Fiscal Year 2021, there was a net gain +346,648. Ending cash balance \$2,448,743. Had operational maintenance savings. Well above reserve projections. Board approved minimum targets; well above where the District should be in terms of reserve targets. Mr. Pope mentioned that when staff go through the rate analysis, they will go through some long-range planning aspects.
- Labor costs have been significantly lower than anticipated.
- Calleguas approved a rate increase of 3.5% for 2022.
- o Mr. Pope explained that staff will include inflationary increases for next year in their rate analysis with Labor at 3.5%, Electricity at 4%, and materials and everything else at 3%. These are planning assumptions and an estimate. The big-ticket items are the new reservoir and the pipeline project. The District does have a \$1.74M State Revolving Loan.
- Mr. Pope mentioned that Reservoir #1 is anticipated to be recoated in Fiscal Year 2024; the intent is to fund that out of the reserves.

- o The past rate increases had higher fixed meter rate increases. The fixed meter rates were bringing in more revenues and less dependent on water sales. Mr. Pope explained that this year, he is proposing a 4 ½ % increase for both the commodity variable charges and fixed charges. This increase would not go into effect until February of 2022. Under CA State Law, if approved by the Board of Supervisors, the District could opt for pass-through rates, of up to 5 years. Whatever Calleguas picks as their rate for 2023-26, the District would do a rate analysis and then all the District must do is a 30-day notification. If Calleguas goes up 6%, then the District would go up 6%, etc.
- The pass-through rates would save the District a significant amount of staff time. But if Calleguas goes up 2% and the District says that isn't enough and we need to increase 3%, then the District must do a Prop. 218 for that given year. The meter rate would go up just like the water rate at 3%.
- A snapshot of the projected budget is about 6.6% of adopted vs. requested, not actuals. In the next 5 years, if the District does not do rate increases, it would not be sustainable. The loan Mr. Pope must get from the state, is dependent on going to the county's financial planning committee to get approval, and then go to the Board of Supervisors for approval. One thing Mr. Pope explained he must show, is stable finances, at least as far out as can be projected to control. Mr. Pope reiterated that staff are proposing a 4.5% Commodity and Meter rate increase.
- o Mr. Sokoler proposed that members do not vote on the proposed rate increases until all are present. Mr. Pope suggested that the CAC have another meeting where all are present. Mr. Pope recommended that the Committee have a vote now to allow administrative move ahead and then another vote later, with all included, with any additional comments or questions.

#### B. CAPITAL PROJECTS -

The reservoir project: There was some progress connecting with the fire department. PWA-W&S got the work plan for the Helipad to be included in the design. Additionally, PWA-W&S is working with a standard to include additional work for the fire department request, and is in the process of doing a contract modification to include and add scope of work including a set of pipeline and location of pipe. When PWA-W&S gets the preliminary design, then they will go for the technical study and environmental clearance. Mr. Pope explained that now, staff is working with a consultant on the scope of work. Mr. Pope explained that the location of the reservoir will be the SW corner of Bell Canyon, on the 78-acre parcel that the association owns. Once there is a preliminary design done, the neighbor will be contacted, so that PWA-W&S can show how it is going to look. Mr. Kim explained that the preliminary design should be ready in about 2-3 months or early 2022.

#### C. WATER QUALITY REPORT -

The report is not available currently.

#### D. WATER SUPPLY CONDITIONS -

 Mr. Pope explained that there is a water supply shortage. PWA-W&S will be asking a level two water supply shortage, a voluntary 15% shortage. The hope is that customers will cut back on watering.

## E. CALLEGUAS MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT/ METROPOLITAN WATER DISTRICT OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA UPDATE –

 Diamond Valley Lake Storage is a critical piece of structure, you can see it still has a good supply in Hemet. It has been online for 20 years. We have paid into this investment for the District. Calleguas and Metropolitan's declarations will be modeled by PWA-W&S.

#### F. UPDATE ON AVENUES OF PUBLIC OUTREACH -

 PWA-W&S sent out some messaging over the past month, on the water supply issues, and eblasts to try to cut back on watering.

#### G. BOARD LETTER TRACKER -

Today the Board passed the Updated Rules and Regulations.

### H. UPDATE ON ADVANCED METERING INFRASTRUCTURE (AMI) -

193 customers between WWD17 and WWD38 have signed up for AMI.
 Aged report, we have \$31,891 past due. We have a lien process and will be pursuing the federal recovery act funding through the state.

#### I. OPERATIONS & MAINTENANCE -

o Mr. Pope discussed the Engineering and Development Fees Update. Some examples of fees which will increase are to upgrade meters, establish a new connection. Meter fees. Some fees haven't been updated since 1994. Ryan Lippincott has been working on updating these fees, not associated with rates. He has been studying current labor/materials costs, in order to account for these costs in the fees.

#### J. DIRECTOR'S INFORMATIONAL ITEMS -

- o Mr. Pope mentioned that his assistant, Julie Taylor, will send out some dates for another meeting to take a vote on rate increases. Mr. Price suggested that there be a meeting in one week. The intention is to get all five members together.

1. CALL TO ORDER - The meeting was called to order at 7:11 PM

- 4. DISCUSSION OF WATER RATES

#### A. DISCUSSION OF RECOMMENDED WATER RATE INCREASE FOR 2022

- Mr. Pope discussed the written materials included in the Agenda Packet, including the following:
  - The District ended Fiscal Year 2021 with a healthy reserve fund balance of \$2.4 million.
  - Calleguas Municipal Water District approved a rate increase of 3.5% for 2022.
  - For the rate analysis, there were the following assumed inflationary increases: labor 3.5%, electricity 4%, materials 3%.
  - The 1.74MG Reservoir and Saddlebow Pipeline projects will be financed by a 0% interest State Revolving Fund Loan with 30% principal forgiveness.
  - The repair and recoating of Reservoir #1 that is planned for Fiscal Year 2024 will be funded from reserves.
  - Past rate increases and proportionally higher fixed meter rate increases put the District in good financial condition, allowing modest inflationary increases in future years.
- Mr. Pope is proposing a 4.5% rate increase for both commodity and fixed charges for 2022.
- Mr. Pope showed the respective Calleguas and District commodity rate increases since 2011. The average for Calleguas over the period was 4.9%,

while the District's average was 3.8%. This is because the District did not raise rates for some of the years.

## B. DISCUSSION OF RECOMMENDED PASS-THROUGH RATE INCREASES FOR CALENDAR YEARS 2023 THROUGH 2027

- Mr. Pope provided an explanation of pass-through rates.
  - First, Mr. Pope explained that there is no mechanism to protest rate increases by wholesale retailers of water, such as Calleguas. There is no Proposition 218 notice requirement.
  - What a pass-through rate increase would be is an authorization ahead of time to adopt Calleguas's rate increase in the summer of 2022, whenever the rate increase goes into effect (likely in January).
     What this would allow is not to have to go through the Proposition 218 requirements.
- A discussion was held to discuss the possible benefits and possible disadvantages of adopting pass-through rate increases.
  - Since Bell Canyon uses 100% Calleguas water, the pass-through rate increase would save administrative time and the cost of the Proposition 218 notice. This would save the District a significant amount of staff time.
  - There would still be a rate analysis to determine if the Calleguas rate increase is sufficient, but assuming that the Calleguas rate increase is sufficient, it would be adopted without having to go to the Board of Supervisors.
  - However, an important question that remains is whether the passthrough rate increase would apply to the meter charges. Mr. Pope mentioned that there could be an argument made for both sides of this question.
  - o Mr. Pope mentioned that one possibility could be to approve the pass-through rate increase, and each year apply the rate increase to both the commodity and fixed charges, or just the commodity charges, and determine if the resulting rate increase is sufficient.
  - Mr. Price mentioned that a concern could be that the Calleguas rate increase in the price of their water may not be sufficient to account for inflation in labor, materials, and upkeep. Other members stated that they shared in Mr. Price's concern.
  - In looking at Mr. Pope's written materials, if a 4.5% rate increase were to be applied each year, a member concern could be that the cash reserves might decrease over time.
  - Mr. Pope mentioned another idea, which is to adopt a multi-year rate increase that is not tied to pass-through rates. This would also avoid a necessary rate increase being derailed by a Proposition 218 opposition campaign.

- o Mr. Pope mentioned that the District's current financial situation is healthy, and that it is up to the members to decide if they would like to adopt pass-through rate increases. Mr. Pope mentioned that it is possible that Calleguas will face the same inflationary costs that the District will face, so the pass-through rate increases may be sufficient to account for inflation in labor, etc.
- Mr. Pope mentioned that WWD1 did accept and agree to passthrough rate increases, and they use 80% Calleguas imported water. WWD1 does have slightly lower rates overall, likely because they have so many service connections (over 11,000) and are able to use groundwater.
- o Mr. Pope explained that it would not be necessary to adopt the full Calleguas rate increase. After a rate analysis, the District could decide to adopt a lower rate increase than Calleguas. Alternatively, the District could opt to propose a larger rate increase, which would require Proposition 218 notice and a return to the Board of Supervisors.
- Mr. Pope explained that the law authorizing pass-through rate increases takes into consideration the fact that water districts do not have any control over the rate increases imposed on them by water wholesalers.
- Mr. Pope suggested collecting more data, by passing the 4.5% rate increase for 2022 and then next fall, revisiting the idea of passthrough rate increases.
- The members voted to approve the 4.5% recommended increase for 2022.
  - Mr. Price moved to approve the 4.5% recommended increase on the commodity and fixed charges for 2022. Ms. Riccomini seconded the motion. Upon being given the opportunity, no member spoke in opposition.
  - Mr. Pope mentioned that this rate increase will be heard in January of 2022 by the Board of Supervisors and will go into effect in February of 2022.

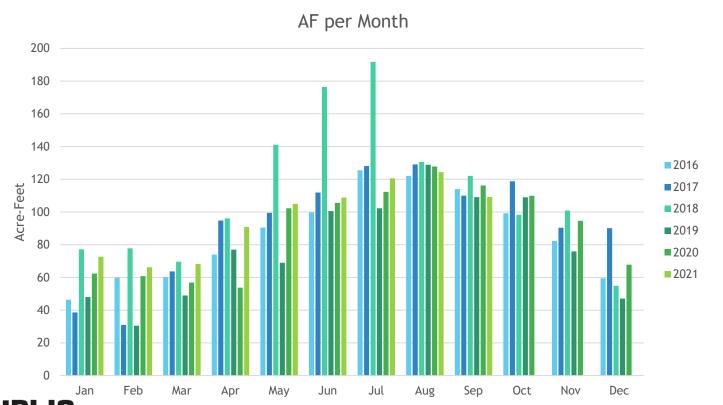

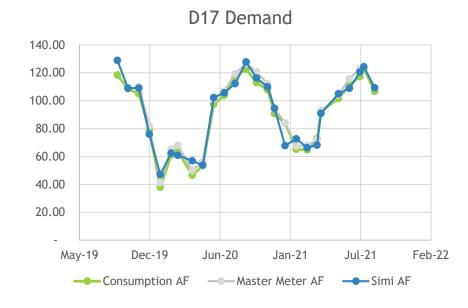

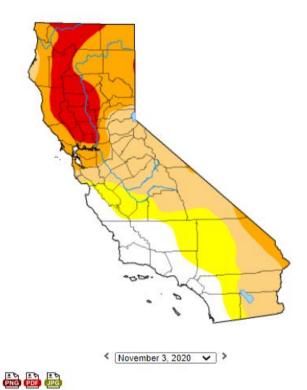

## **Drought Classification**





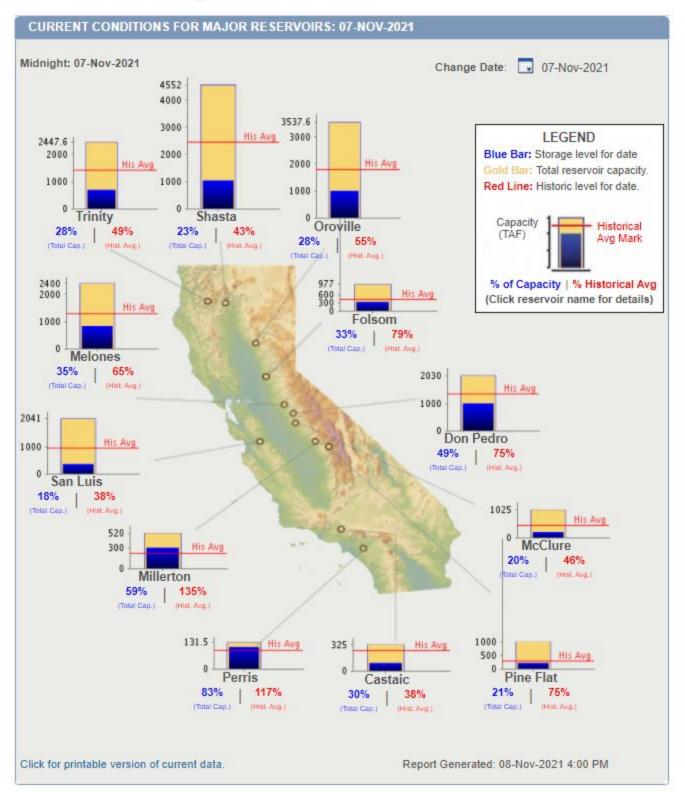

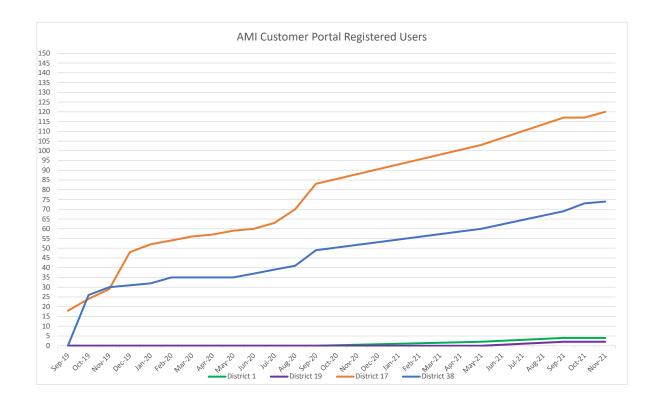
